

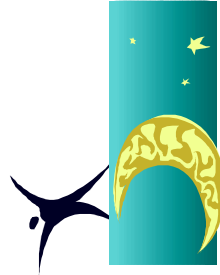

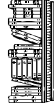

Buffy Books

If you love Buffy, you've probably already found the **Buffy novels** in the library. Buffy books and comics range from new settings of episodes (told from a specific character's point of view, like **The Angel Chronicles**), to totally new adventures (like **The Gatekeeper Trilogy**). Christopher Golden, Nancy Holder, Richie Tankersley Cusick and Yvonne Navarro are just a few of the Buffy authors to know.

There are **nonfiction books** about the show, too. Some of the best:

The Watcher's Guide Vols. 1 & 2

The Monster Book

Edited by Christopher Golden and Nancy Holder, these books feature not just episode guides, but interviews with the creators of the show that shed serious light on the Buffyverse. You'll find them at 791.4572.

If you like **graphic novels**, you have *got* to see **Tales of the Slayers**. Each one is in a different style, and each one tells the story of a different Slayer—from the very beginning, to the far future.

Buffy the Vampire Slayer: Origin

Cate Tiernen's **Sweep** series, beginning with Book of Shadows. *Morgan Rowlands discovers a new life and surprising new powers when beautiful Cal Blaire comes to town.*

Neal Shusterman's The Dark Side of Nowhere. *Josh Miller thinks his small-town life couldn't be more boring—until he finds out who he really is, and what he and his friends were born for.*

Isobel Bird's **Book of Three** trilogy, beginning with So Mote It Be. *Kate Morgan's life is rearranged when she finds a magic book, and two unexpected new friends.*

Barbara Cohen's Tell Us Your Secret. *Horror isn't just ghost stories when a group of teens at writer's camp uncover pain they hadn't imagined.*

Susan Cooper's **The Dark Is Rising** sequence, starting with Over Sea, Under Stone. *Simon, Barney and Jane Drew are drawn into an ancient struggle between good and evil.*

Rhiannon Lassiter's **Hex** trilogy. *In the 24th-century, government experiments put a supercomputer brain in a 15-year-old's body. Meet Raven, the most dangerous girl in the world.*
